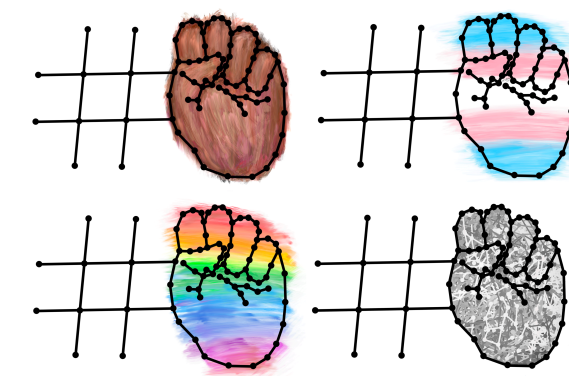

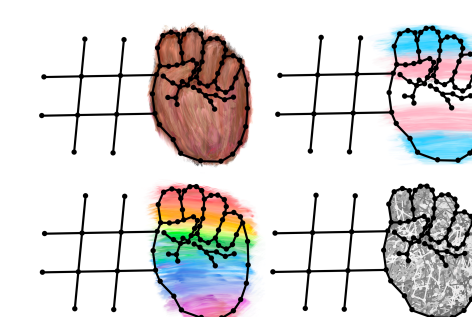

In the United States...

1 in every 3 women has experienced an act of sexual violence

1 in every 6 women has experienced rape or attempted rape

1 in every 6 women has experienced stalking

1 in every 3 women has experienced intimate partner violence

1 in every 3 women has experienced sexual harassment in the workplace

In the United States...

1 in every 3 women has experienced an act of sexual violence

1 in every 6 women has experienced rape or attempted rape

1 in every 6 women has experienced stalking

1 in every 3 women has experienced intimate partner violence

1 in every 3 women has experienced sexual harassment in the workplace

Yet, due to stigmatization...

The majority of experiences of sexual violence are never formally reported

Of survivors who do disclose, most disclose informally to a close friend

Online Disclosures and #MeToo

Social media has been instrumental for allowing individuals to **anonymously** disclose to **audiences of strangers** with shared stigmatized experiences

Social media has been instrumental for allowing individuals to **anonymously** disclose to **audiences of strangers** with shared stigmatized experiences

In 48 hours though...

#MeToo and "metoo" was used **12 million** times on Facebook

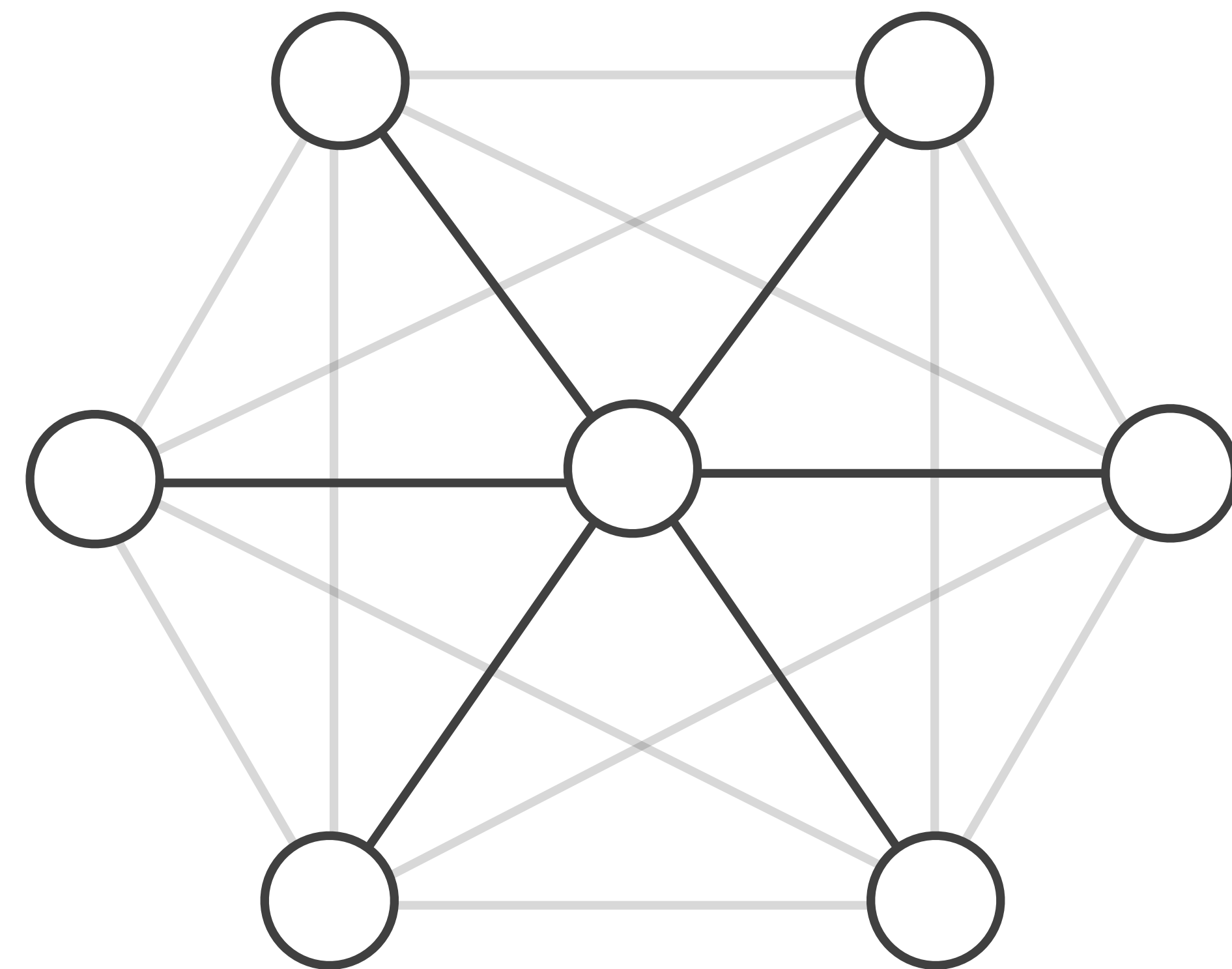
#MeToo was used **1 million** times on Twitter

45% of Facebook users had a friend disclose "me too"

#MeToo Data

1,245,196 #MeToo tweets from the 2 weeks following its widespread use in Oct. 2017

Follower-following ego networks of those who tweeted #MeToo (one-step snowball)

244,229 replies to those #MeToo tweets

Mixed Methods Approach

Qualitative content analysis (N = 2,500 tweets)



Automated classification of disclosures (N = 450,000 authored tweets)



Quantitative and network analysis (N = 1.5 million tweets)

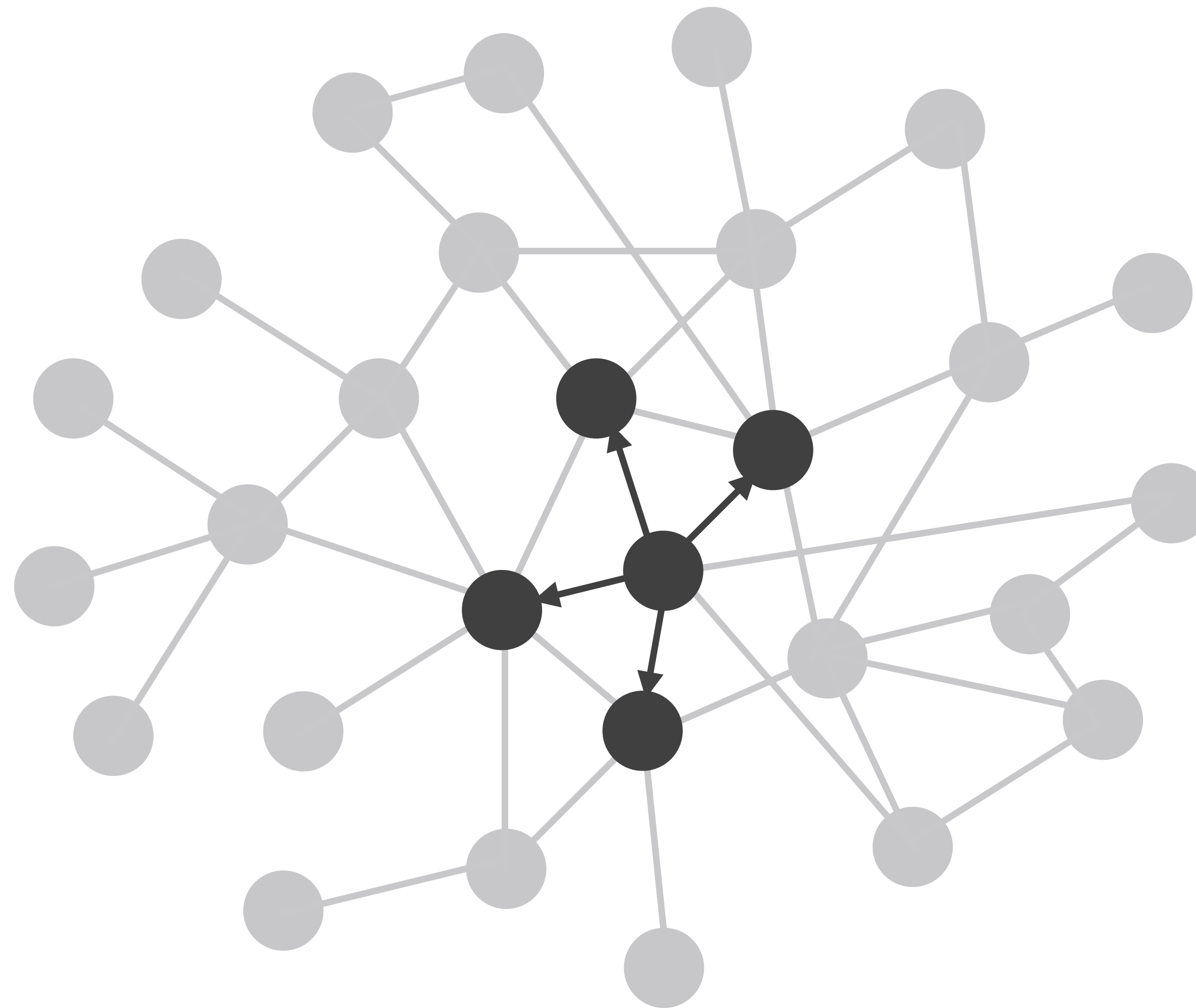

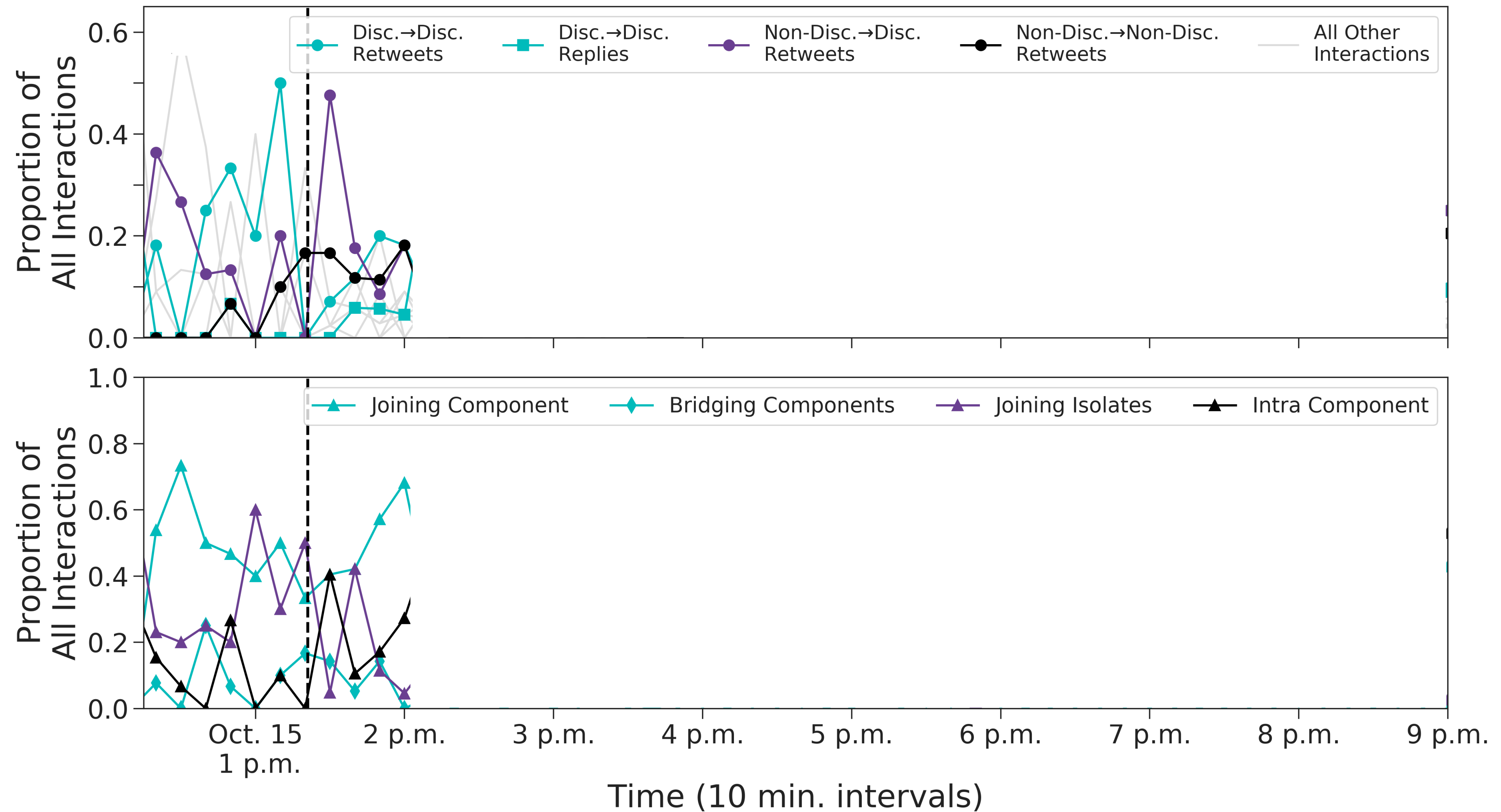
Emergence of the #MeToo Network



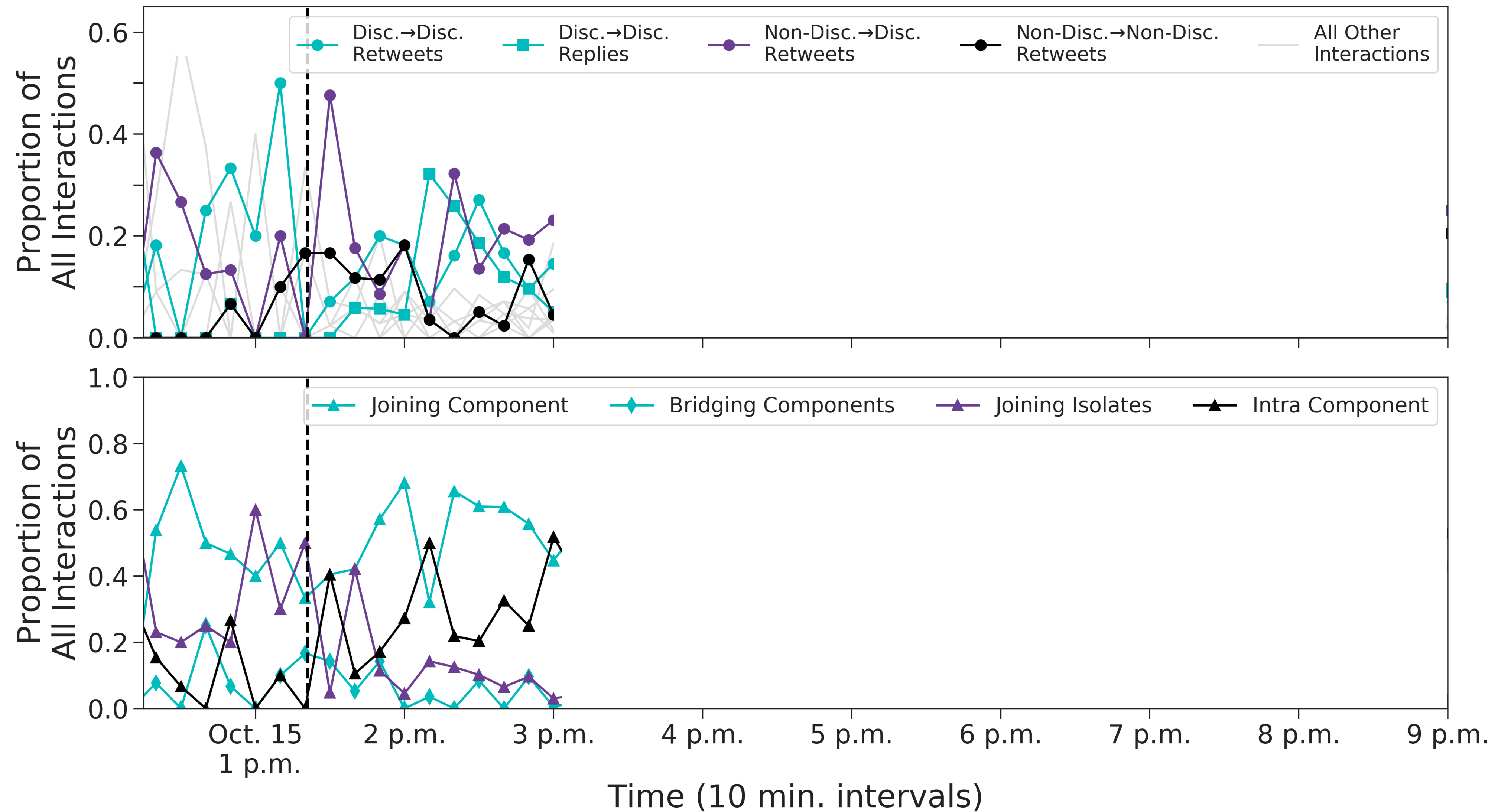

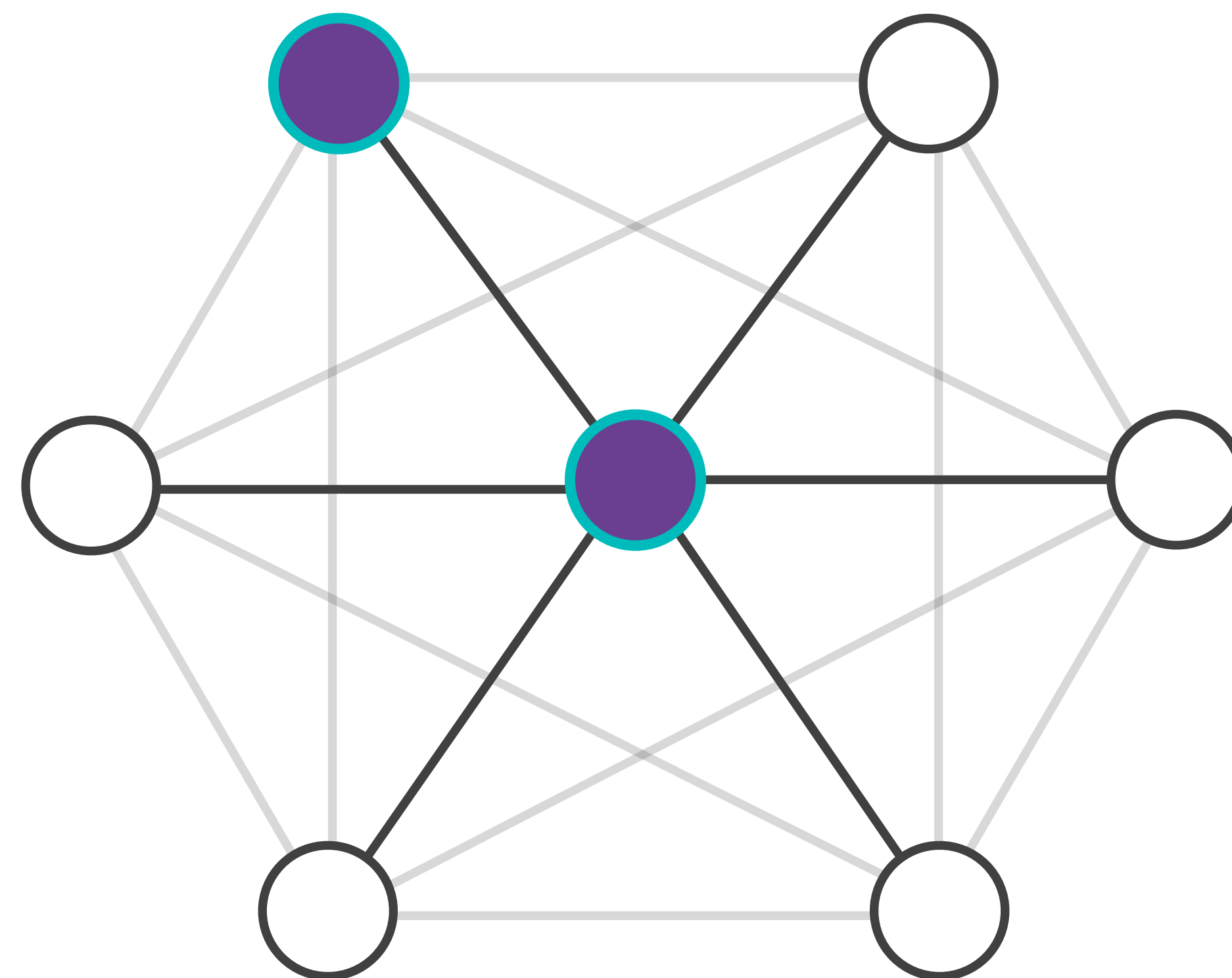
Summary

#MeToo gave a space for women to disclose, and encouraged network-level reciprocal disclosures

Network-level reciprocal disclosures helped give momentum to #MeToo as a hashtag activism campaign

Limitation: we only see network-level reciprocal disclosures among those who disclosed, *we can't know who could have disclosed but chose not to*

Potential: in further studies of #MeToo and other hashtag activism campaigns, network science and qualitative methods can work together to yield deeper insights

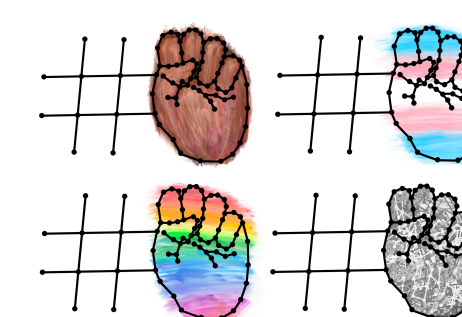

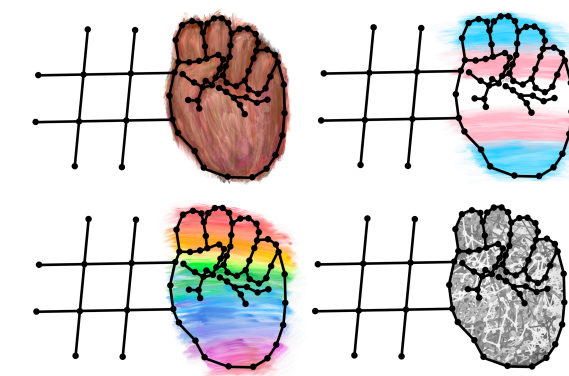
